




























#### WHAT IS A SENIOR?

The eagerness, loyalty, and support of this Junior Class will never be forgotten.






Football, basketball, hockey, skiing, wrestling, track, and cross-country are our major sports events. Every student has the opportunity to try his hand at any of the sports.

















(Above) Checking a Fairbanks shot are Roger Sorenson (14) and Richard Scott (12).







as the slopes remained rocky and snowless.




#### WRESTLING GOES INTO 2nd YEAR





er, fourth place 15 points.



#### MEMBERS UPHOLD THE HIGH STANDARDS OF NHS









#### THESPIANS ENTER LIMELIGHT IN '63






#### GIRL'S LEAGUE REVIVED AT WEST






